"Behind and underneath all this there is a holy, God-planted, God-tended root. If the primary root of the tree is holy, there's bound to be some holy fruit. Some of the tree's branches were pruned and your wild olive shoots were grafted in. Yet the fact that you are now fed by that rich and holy root gives you no cause to crow over the pruned branches. Remember, you aren't feeding the root; the root is feeding you."

The Holidays bring back powerful memories. Some come to my mind on a regular basis, others return at the craziest times. Yet each time I am transported back in years, those memories feed my soul. They aren't so much reminders of what I now miss, but rather touch points of where I have been, and with whom. I've been thinking a lot lately about holes in our gospel. Some, I think we realize quite easily, others sneak up on us like a good story or a parable. They catch us unawares, but put a hitch in our breath and fill our eyes with cleansing stuff...I remembered a story.

When I was much younger, and our family gathered together was peopled by folks who now reside in eternity, we had some interesting traditions. My grandmother used to like to make cream pies. We loved them. We only really saw them around the holidays and looked forward to them. They were tasty and held a special treat if you were sneaky enough to attempt to get away with it. The meringue layer on the top of the pie would be baked. My grandmother liked to peak the meringue. It looked decorative, but also provided wonderful pickup points for dollops of baked meringue.

From the time the pies were set on the counter to the time they were brought to the table, many of us saw those meringue peaks as fair game. By the time dessert would roll around, and the pies would be brought to the table, it appeared as though they were indeed full of holes. Throughout the course of the day, those meringue peaks had been surgically removed, leaving holes where they used to reside. We cut the remains of the pies and enjoyed them just the same.



Advent has always been the season that fills me with the greatest amount of joy. I remember thinking something was wrong with me during my childhood because I was keenly aware that I enjoyed the time leading up to Christmas more than I enjoyed Christmas Day itself. We had plenty of gifts and festivities, but what sticks with me are uneventful quiet nights spent with my immediate family simply absorbing the light of the season. My gaze would alternate between huge snowflakes dancing diagonally into the streetlights and the old-fashioned multicolored lights on the Christmas tree. As the holidays are rapidly approaching, I am both thankful for and impressed by our Church family. There are many exciting things happening across the congregation with worship, discipleship, and missions. Having just returned from a mission trip in Puerto Rico, I was amazed at the joyous service exhibited by all of our volunteers.

I am also thankful for the generosity exhibited by the congregation. Year-to-date donations and other income through October month-end were just over \$322,000. Overall, our committee chairs have been very good stewards of the gifts that we have been given. Trustees and Finance committees in particular have taken many steps to lower operating costs for the church and the parsonage while still making necessary repairs and completing proactive maintenance. We prioritized apportionment payments and I am happy to report that by year-end, we will have paid both our outstanding 2020 apportionments and our current 2021 apportionments in full. Our total expenses through the end of October were just over \$370,000.

The fact that year-to-date expenses have exceeded income, has resulted in a deficit of just over \$48,000, which has reduced the balance of our General Fund from a healthy \$68,000 at the start of 2021 to only \$20,000. Our Care & Repair Fund balance is just over \$38,000.

As we enter the holiday season together, I hope you will join me in ensuring that any pledged amounts are paid in full and consider offering an additional gift of thanksgiving to the extent you are able. This will help us eliminate this deficit and put us on solid financial ground to start the New Year. There are many exciting things on the horizon for Hudson UMC that will be realized through our prayers, presence, gifts, and service.
