Church Council (Church Leadership Team): • clarifies ministry goals, sets priorities, coordinates the work of leaders, and directs the committee on nominations and leadership development concerning leadership needs; • oversees leader development as one component of disciple formation.

Staff/Pastor-Parish Relations Committee: • identifies and supports candidates for church vocations; • builds relations of appointed and employed staff with the congregation.

Trustees: The trustees together have several legal and administrative functions. They are to: • oversee, maintain, and supervise all local church property; • report annually to the charge conference on the state of the church's property, equipment, investments, and resources; • receive and administer all gifts made to the congregation; make certain that all trust funds of the congregation are invested properly;

• ensure that the articles of incorporation of the congregation are kept up to date, if applicable; • maintain adequate insurance coverage on all church property and develop appropriate risk management policies.

Finance: is to nurture the financial vitality of the congregation. • oversee stewardship, • compile a budget annually, • raise sufficient income to meet the budget, • administer funds received by the church, • count and deposit the offering, • disburse funds, • establish internal control policies, • review and report annually on the adequacy and effectiveness of internal controls, • use contributions in accordance with donors' intent **Committee on Nominations and Leadership Development**: • identifies, develops, deploys, supports, and evaluates the leadership of laity who work with appointed and employed leaders; • shines a spotlight on leadership development and builds a congregational culture of mentoring, support, and challenge for one another.

A MISSION TO MAKE DISCIPLES

Disciple and Discipleship are words that have come up in many conversations among our church leadership recently, beginning with the October all-church 3R (Reflect, Realign, Renew) planning/visioning meetings. If you attended any of those meetings, then you may remember that there was much talk regarding the idea of alignment around a common goal or mission. In other words, Hudson UMC will be most effective in achieving what we set out to do if we're all paddling in the same direction. The question then becomes, "What are we setting out to do?" or "What is our purpose?"

An answer to this question has already been provided for us by Jesus in his Great Commission:

Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

The United Methodist Church has aligned its own mission statement with the Great Commission: *To make and mature disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world*. (Book of Discipline). The Discipline further goes on to state that Local churches and *extension ministries of the Church provide the most significant arenas through which disciplemaking occurs*.

In light of this, we came away from the 3R meetings with a commitment to align our own purpose as a local Methodist church around the UMC mission and The Great Commission. We are about making disciples. This is the direction in which we have chosen to face.

Before we take our first step, however, it's important that we pause to define our terminology. What exactly **is** a disciple? Here is my short answer: A disciple is one who not only knows about God's will but is conducting one's life according to God's standards. This person is in the process of discovering their own place in fulfilling God's purposes and is seeking ways to live it uniquely and authentically in the world. There is both choice and personal responsibility associated with growing oneself as a disciple.



In making disciples, the church carries a responsibility as well. Through its resources, the church may help to define a pathway to discipleship and inspire all encountered to pursue their own journeys. It is the church's role to provide invitations and opportunities for those seeking to grow in their spiritual walk. In practice, this covers everything from visitor hospitality and fellowship to education and discovery to leadership, service, and mission. Removing any obstacles that might block the development or pursuit of this pathway is a crucial step.

Because discipleship often begins with education, the CEC (Christian Education Committee) team has taken on the task of discernment around creating a discipleship plan for Hudson UMC. As we know, however, pursuing discipleship involves deeds in response to knowledge, so we expect that this effort will grow to become church-wide, involving multiple committees, teams, and leaders.

We, as a church, are at the cusp of creating a culture at HUMC that enables personal spiritual transformation and intentional action for all ages and stages. We work in expectation that lives will be changed. It's challenging. It's exciting. And it's no less than what we are here to do.
