





- Have opportunities for your team to apply what you are learning by designing a plan to create and rollout a discipleship process for your church





SPIRITUAL FORMATION

"Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming. 


Where are we now?

- What is working well in the area of discipleship now in your church?
- What signs have you seen in your church indicating a need to focus on discipleship?



Turnover

- New guests not returning first- and second-time guests, not part of a special event, do not seem to return. (The back door of the church is as large as the front door.)
- Losing people after a major event. Sometimes people come to a baptism, wedding, confirmation, VBS, mission trip, or new facility opening never to return once that event is over. (Not talking about friends or family specially invited to an event.)



- New members who are excited to join. They initially get involved in various ministries, and then suddenly stop coming.
- Long-term members who leave over some minor issue. "How dare they change the color of the carpet without consulting me!"

Serving



• Inability to fill volunteer positions. The church finds itself resorting to begging people to serve and in some cases even threatening, "If no one steps up to serve, then we will stop this ministry!"

- New members and attenders coming to worship, but not serving anywhere.
- Established members reporting ministry "burn-out."

Evangelism

- Members and attendees not inviting family or friends to worship or other church events.
- Church events that are only fellowship gatherings instead of "bridge-events." Bridge events allow new people to experience the church in a safe, nonthreatening way and receive an invitation to attend a worship service.
- Ministries not producing new fruit. Instead, they just move people from group to group or study to study.

Generosity

- State of the church finances. The church lives from offering to offering and always talks about how to raise money and cut expenses.
- Members and attendees' finances. People do not grow in their financial giving from year to year.
- Too much dedicated giving. The church finds itself emphasizing funding specific ministries instead of focusing on the general ministry fund.

• Church ministries being funded by selling items or holding special fund-raising events. For example, the youth ministry is totally dependent on selling cookies. The annual white elephant sale is the only funding for the women's ministry.

- Leaders are not setting the example by tithing.
- The congregation's discomfort with money. Members do not want the pastor to talk about money or know about how much each person or family gives.



DEFINE **D**ISCIPLESHIP

"Discipleship is the process of establishing the character of Christ in the person. That's all it is. You are taking on the character of Christ in a process of discipleship to him under the direction of the Holy Spirit and the Word of God.

Discipleship is not about being like Jesus, but about being who Jesus would be if Jesus were you."

- Dallas Willard

A DISCIPLESHIP PROCESS IS


- An intentional process that provides the resources and direction for each individual to grow closer to Christ in all areas of spiritual disciplines.
- A means for people to connect on-going to the Great Commission with their personal, daily lives
- A process that provides next steps for a person's journey to grow spiritually

"The ministry is to be carried out by people, not programs. It is to be carried out by someone and not something. Disciples cannot be mass produced. We cannot drop people into a 'program' and see disciples emerge at the end of a production line. It takes time to make disciples. It takes individual, personal attention.

It takes hours of prayer for them. It takes patience and understanding to teach them how to get into the Word of God themselves, how to feed and nourish their souls, and by the power of the Holy Spirit how to apply the Word to their lives. And it takes being an example to them of all of the above." – Leroy Eims, <u>The Lost Art of Disciplemaking</u>

Three Stages



STAGE ONE: PREPARATION


1) - Great Things Begin with Prayer!

2) - Recommitting to Our Mission

Jesus came near and spoke to them, "I've received all authority in heaven and on earth. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey everything that I've commanded you. Look, I myself will be with you every day until the end of this present age."

- Great Commission = Mission
- Intent of the passage is to make (evangelize)
 AND mature (edify) disciples
- Involves the process of moving people from wherever you find them (lost or saved) along a continuum toward maturity







- 1) Invitation Begin Start Entrance
 - How does the current congregation engage with the discipleship process?
 - Where does someone new to your church start?

2) Community – Relationship – Connect – Belong – Formation

- Where can people in your church connect and grow with others in Christian community?
- 3) Learn Education Teach Become Grow
 - Where can people learn to be more like Jesus?

- 4) Serve Mission Outreach Bless Give Go
 - Where can people in your church use their gifts and passion to benefit others?
 - What levels of service do you offer? (i.e. in the church, in the local community, around the country, around the world)



- 3) Themselves Spiritual Gifts / Spiritual Practices / Discipleship





STAGE TWO: IMPLEMENTATION

10) – Coaching

Best Practices:

- Invest in training a person or two in coaching skills
- Develop a pre-work selfassessment of spiritual practices and feelings
- Celebrate their journey, listen to their experiences, explore their gifts/passion and connect them to appropriate ministries
- Create a next step plan for the next season – send a follow-up note
- Offer to meet with them again schedule a day/time



TEN KEYS TO A CLEAR DISCIPLESHIP PROCESS


- 1. Offer the congregation, the unchurched, and the marginally churched a clear place to **enter** your process
- 2. Provide a safe and structured way for people to explore and ask questions
- 3. Help people develop and grow **relationships** within your church
- 4. Present a common **foundation** of church values, beliefs, culture, etc.
- 5. Equip people to take next steps as they follow Jesus Christ
- 6. Match people with ministries based on their passions and gifts
- 7. Encourage existing members to come alongside others on their journey
- 8. Remind everyone that we are all imperfect and a work-in-progress
- 9. Promote a more sacrificial model of church membership
- 10. Grow current and new leaders for ministry

Celebration of Discipline by Richard J. Foster


- Joy is the keynote of all the Disciplines.
